were approximately 130 attendees present for the two-day event, which included seventeen sessions and more than forty presentations. At the presidential banquet, held at the Ant Street Inn Banquet Hall, CTHA President Larry Watson presented an engaging and informative discussion on the prophetic revelations of Sam Houston. At the Saturday luncheon, Mrs. Sharon Brass presented an interesting address on the burning of

Brenham, an act that occurred during the Reconstruction era. Following the close of the conference, some members enjoyed touring Brenham's Simon Theater, an

early 20th century theater that a group of local citizens has restored to its former glory. MANAGING EDITOR'S CORNER



Work on the 2017 journal is right on schedule. The second volume of *Central Texas Studies* will feature three articles (by Debbie Liles, Cecilia Gutierrez Venable, and

Chuck Parsons); more than a dozen book reviews; an indepth interview with Lamar University's Mary Scheer; and a "Notes and Documents" section. Texas A&M University Press will distribute the journal, which should arrive in your mailbox in December.

I am currently reading *Peter Bogdanovich: Interviews* (University Press of Mississippi, 2015), a terrific collection of discussions with the noted filmmaker, edited by Peter Tonguette. Cinema enthusiasts know Bogdanovich as the director of *The Last Picture Show*, the landmark 1971 film set in a fading West Texas hamlet. Critic Chris Nashawaty calls the movie a "bittersweet elegy for small-town America...a timeless classic" that "feels as tragic and aching (and racy) today as it did when it was released 46 years ago." Based on the novel by Larry McMurtry, Bogdanovich's iconic film received eight Academy Award nominations. Until next time, keep on reading!

Dr. Lynn M. Burlbaw, Professor of Education at Texas A&M University, is a Life Member of CTHA and has been with the Association since its inception. He currently serves on the CTHA Board of Directors, the CTHA Finance and Audit Committee, and is the Chair of the CTHA Education Committee. After

earning his B. A. degree from the University of Albuquerque and M. A. Degree from Eastern New Mexico University, Dr. Burlbaw received a Ph.D. in Education from The University of Texas at Austin. He has served as a professor in the Department of Teaching, Learning and Culture within the College of Education at Texas A&M University since 1989. Dr. Burlbaw's expertise is in curriculum development and in the history of education. Not only is he actively involved with student organizations on campus, Professor Burlbaw is also very involved with numerous professional associations, including the American Association for Teaching and Curriculum and the Society for the Study of Curriculum History. He is a frequent presenter to history organizations in Texas, especially the Texas



State Historical Association and the East Texas Historical Association. Dr. Burlbaw's research interest are related to the history of education, social studies education, curriculum development and evaluation, computer applications in education, science-technology-and-society issues, learning and evaluation, and public history (including archaeology). CTHA is fortunate to have Dr. Lynn Burlbaw as a member and an officer of the Association.

CTHA FEATURED PUBLICATION



CTHA members will find Bob Alexander and Donaly Brice's new book on the Texas Rangers a welcome addition to Ranger historiography. Below is from the University of North Texas Press's website.

Authors Bob Alexander and Donaly E. Brice grappled with several

issues when deciding how to relate a general history of the Texas Rangers. Should emphasis be placed on their frontier defense against Indians, or focus more on their role as guardians of the peace and statewide law enforcers? What about the tumultuous Mexican Revolution period, 1910–1920? And how to deal with myths and legends such as One Riot, One Ranger?

Texas Rangers: Lives, Legend, and Legacy is the authors' answer to these questions, a one-volume history of the Texas Rangers. The authors begin with the earliest Rangers in the pre-Republic years in 1823 and take the story up through the Republic, Mexican War, and Civil War. Then, with the advent of the Frontier Battalion, the authors focus in detail on each company A through F, relating what was happening within each company concurrently. Thereafter, Alexander and Brice tell the famous episodes of the Rangers that forged their legend, and bring the story up through the twentieth century to the present day in the final chapters.
